RETIREES SPOTLIGHT Patricia Pierce



Pat graduated cum laude from Dunbarton College of Holy Cross in Washington DC in 1963, majoring in Mathematics. After graduation, she went to work for IBM teaching programming to both IBMers and customers. Pat met her husband-to-be, Oliver G. Roth, also an IBMer, in a 6-week training program in Newark, New Jersey. They were married in 1965. She continued to teach programming part-time at various colleges as Ollie and Pat moved around the country with IBM. When they moved to Atlanta in 1981, where her fifth child was born, she began teaching once again as a part timer during the spring of 1982 at Southern Tech (officially known at that time as Southern Technical Institute). She was teaching Fortran and COBOL to students in the Industrial Engineering Department - there was no Computer Science Department at that time!

In 1986, the name was changed to Southern College of Technology. By 1996, the academic program had substantially expanded, and the name was again changed to Southern Polytechnic State University. SPSU became a part of Kennesaw State University in 2015 and now Computing and Software Engineering is a School within KSU.

After teaching full time for IBM for several years, she taught part-time at colleges while the family moved with IBM and she was raising her five children. Fast forward to 2002 when she received her master's degree in Software Engineering from SPSU and began teaching full time as a lecturer there in 2002. She is proud to be the first Lecturer at SPSU to be promoted to Senior Lecturer status in 2008.

Pat retired in June 2019 and has enjoyed the peace and quiet that retirement can bring. However, she stays busy with neighbors and friends she has known now for over 40 years in East Cobb. She travels to see her children, grandchildren, and friends all over the United States. She also volunteers to help feed the homeless at Must Ministries - she has been doing that since 1992. She likes to work outside trimming and weeding at her home in East Cobb and at her house near Lake Lanier. the two houses she owns. Pat loves tennis and played for many years. She was instrumental in starting a Neighborhood Book club and facilitated a Women's Bagel Outing monthly.

Pat's 5 children have given her 10 grandchildren - three live in Cumming, Georgia, two live in Canton, Georgia, three live in Arlington, Virginia and two live in Raleigh, North Carolina. She remarried in 2008 to widower, Jerry Pierce, who also taught at SPSU. (Her first husband died of a heart attack at age 53 in 1994.) Jerry and she travelled to Australia, Hong Kong, Bangkok, and Singapore for their honeymoon and to Alaska on a cruise when she retired.

Pat always says that she sort of identifies with the women in the movie "Hidden Figures". Her first job as an intern in college was adding long lists of numbers with a desk hand cranked calculator for the National Map Service in Washington D.C. Now look at what she has done "taught thousands of students programming in multiple languages on the computer for over 56 years before retiring". She is most proud of that!

Pat is currently an active member of the KSU Retirees Association Steering Committee and trying to get more SPSU retirees to join in the KSU Retirees activities.

Book Nook Reviewed by Chuck Aust

A brief review of Surviving the Death of a Sibling by T.J. Wray (2003; 247 pages)

A difficult but important and relevant topic during this chapter of our lives as we age and experience our retirement years: the loss of loved ones.

I'd like to share this well-written book with all of you in our Retirees Association in case you or someone close to you might find it helpful.

There are a lot of books about grief. This one, Surviving the Death of a Sibling by T.J. Wray addresses a particular type of loss. The subtitle describes it in a nutshell: "Living through grief when an adult brother or sister dies."

The author lost her brother when he was 43. I owe a debt of thanks to my dear friend Candra for telling me about this book. She, at age 28, lost her 18-year-old brother in a motorcycle wreck. I lost my younger brother several years ago when he was 63. Losing loved ones is a sad but real part of life.

Wray has lots of wisdom to offer, some of it her own and some from the many brief testimonials she quotes. Here's a sampling of the many insights and coping strategies:

- \cdot "You are entitled to feel whatever it is you are feeling" (p. 35 in the chapter "Shock")
- · "Because we've known our siblings all our lives, we may have an excessive amount of guilt baggage" (p. 132 in the chapter "Guilt, Regrets, Conflicts," aptly subtitled "Shoulda, Coulda, Woulda")
- · Consider recruiting a "grief partner,"
- · Keep a grief journal.

A few features of the book make it a practical resource that we can refer to as needed, as well as a comforting, reassuring companion on our grief journey.

- 1) She offers at the end of each chapter a section she labels "What Helps."
- 2) The many brief testimonials and anecdotes reassure readers that they are not alone in this particular type of loss. Grief can trigger a lot of unusual, sometimes bizarre reactions. But this is another way the testimonials help the

reader to feel less isolated and alone in their reactions to loss and their struggles to work through grief.

3) The author provides an appendix with additional resources related to the issues addressed in each chapter, along with a list of recommended reading.


Chapter titles indicate the comprehensive, practical scope of the book and the empathic nature of the topics: Shock; Denial; Anger; Guilt, Regret, Conflicts; Depression; Dreams; Faith, Religion, and Spirituality; Acceptance.

Grief is a difficult life challenge for all of us. Mental health experts tell us it is important to face it and work through it. But there are obstacles and cultural

conditions that work against that. For example, others might not want to talk with us about our loss, especially as time goes by, or because they feel awkward about it. People might assume our pain eases with time. We might give the appearance of "getting on with our lives," even though the deep feelings and unusual reactions (e.g., dreams and nightmares) might continue within us long after the event. And it might be difficult if not impossible to find others who knew our sibling well and are willing to give us a compassionate sounding board for our thoughts and feelings.

Wray's book can be a helpful companion as we journey through the challenges of this kind of grief. She and those whose testimonials she includes have much wisdom, insight, and comfort to offer us.

ASUN Conference Update

After adding Eastern Kentucky University and the University of Central Arkansas in 2021, the conference has added two more member institutions in 2022 - Austin Peay State University and Queens University of Charlotte. The ASUN currently has 14 members and will begin sponsoring Division I Football Championship Series (FCS) football in 2022. As a result, Kennesaw State left the Big South conference and will compete in football in the ASUN along with Austin Peay State University, University of Central Arkansas, Eastern Kentucky University, Jacksonville State University and the University of North Alabama. Liberty University, also a member of the ASUN, competes at the Division I FBS level.

Former Owl Daniel Haugh won the gold medal in **track and field** for the hammer throw at the USATF championships in Eugene, OR. He secured a spot in the World Athletics Championships to be held mid-July in Eugene. In addition to Daniel, KSU's Ciara Miles and Xavier Parris competed in the U20 championships. Ciara and Xavier each finished 7th in the 3K.

Volleyball begins their season on August 26 in the Wake Forest tournament. Their first homestand will begin September 1 against Furman, September 2 against High Point and September 6 against Samford. The Owls return five starters from the squad that finished second in the ASUN East with a 13-3 league record and 20-9 overall.

Football starts their first season in the ASUN conference with several preseason recognitions. Xavier Shepherd (quarterback) was named FCS Preseason Most Valuable Player, ASUN Preseason Offensive Player of the Year, and All-FCS Preseason First Team Quarterback. KSU was picked to finish first in the ASUN. KSU's first home game is September 24 against Wofford. Please contact Athletics to purchase season tickets at the faculty-staff discounted rate.

Men's Basketball returns all five starters for the 2022-23 season. They are joined by Temple transfer, Quincy Ademokkoya and Simeon Cottle from College Park. First home game is December 31 against the University of Central Arkansas.

Women's Basketball opens play at home on January 5 against Austin Peay State University.

Forty-four student-athletes graduated in May. Way to go Owls!

Baseball Team wins ASUN Championship

Kudos to new Coach for 2022 ASUN Championship – Ryan Coe was named the new baseball coach at Kennesaw State on Friday, taking over for longtime coach Mike Sansing who recently stepped down from the position after 30 years.

Coe, who played and coached at KSU under Sansing for a combined 15 years, returns to the program after a 12-year spell as a scout for the Texas Rangers.



Kennesaw State baseball defeated Liberty by a final score of 10-6 to claim the 2022 ASUN Championship on Saturday, May 28, 2022 inside Swanson Stadium. This win gives the Owls their first tournament trophy since 2014 and an automatic bid to the NCAA Regionals next weekend. The NCAA Regional Selection Show aired on ESPN2 on Monday, May 31, at noon, where the Owls learned where their season will continue.

It is interesting to note that Josh Hatcher, KSU's center fielder, finished as the national leader in hits (109) and doubles (26). He was named All-ASUN first team, Collegiate Baseball Third Team All-American, Most Valuable Player in the ASUN tournament, All Tournament Team in the NCAA Regionals, and ABCA/Rawlings Southeast All-Region Second Team. Josh is from Albany, GA and a senior majoring in marketing.

Home - OLLI at College of Professional Education - Kennesaw State University



The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia (USG) recently elected Regent Harold Reynolds to a one-year term as the Board's chair and Regent Erin Hames to a one-year term as the Board's vice chair.

Reynolds will serve as Board chair from Jan. 1, 2022, through Dec. 31, 2022. Representing the 10th district on the Board of Regents since 2020, Reynolds is the Chief Executive Officer of the privately held Bank South Holding Company headquartered in Greene County, Georgia. Board of Regents approves no tuition increase for the 2022-23 academic year, with one exception

Atlanta — **April 12, 2022**

The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia (USG) voted today to eliminate the Special Institutional Fee and to not raise tuition rates at most institutions for the 2022-23 academic year, meaning undergraduate and graduate tuition will remain the same for a third year in a row at 25 of 26 institutions.

This is the fifth time in seven years that the Board has approved keeping tuition costs flat across most institutions in the university system.

The one exception is for Middle Georgia State University, which is beginning the first in a three-year plan to bring undergraduate tuition into alignment with other universities in the same academic sector. This means increases ranging from \$17 per credit hour for in-state undergraduates to \$64 per credit hour for out-of-state undergraduate students.

Additionally, the Board also approved eliminating a mandatory Special Institutional Fee charged since 2009 to students systemwide. That action will save students anywhere from \$170 to \$544 per semester depending on which institution they attend.

Kennesaw State University Launches Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary Engineering, Master's in Intelligent Robotic Systems



KENNESAW, Ga. (Apr 13, 2021) — The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia has approved two new degree programs at Kennesaw State University, including the University's first engineering doctoral program.

A Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary Engineering and a Master of Science in Intelligent Robotic Systems will be offered starting in Fall 2021.

"Having long been recognized as one of the state's leaders in engineering education, these two-degree programs will boost our academic profile and allow us to continue meeting the needs of one of the fastest-growing disciplines both here in Georgia and across the nation," said KSU President Pamela Whitten. "I applaud the efforts of our faculty to develop these programs and look forward to further cementing our status as the institution where Georgia's engineers are built."

The Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary Engineering degree program will allow students to work alongside top faculty researchers to generate innovative solutions to real-world problems. The program, which will be supported by all six departments currently housed in KSU's engineering college will help students create a broader engineering foundation rooted in cutting-edge research, tying into the college's overall mission of creating "comprehensive engineers."

In addition to research, the doctoral program will further reduce the talent gap in Georgia, where the need for engineers outpaces the need nationwide. With more than 5,000 students, KSU has the second-largest engineering college in the state and has the largest percentage of engineering graduates who remain in Georgia to work in the profession.

"As a Carnegie-designated university, the new Ph.D. program further builds upon KSU's aspiration of becoming the nation's foremost R2 research institution by generating more scholarship and research opportunities for our students and faculty," said Kathy Schwaig, KSU provost and senior vice president for academic affairs. "Combined with our master's degree in intelligent robotic systems and other existing degrees, the Ph.D. program allows KSU to join an exclusive group of universities to offer a full range of engineering degrees while producing graduates who can tackle problems on Day 1."

The Master of Science in Intelligent Robotic Systems degree will be offered as a one-year, online program focused on the theories and techniques used to design machines with self-autonomy. The program, housed within the Department of Robotics and Mechatronics Engineering, builds upon KSU's successful Bachelor of Science in Mechatronics Engineering degree and mechatronics engineering minor programs.

The graduate program in intelligent robotic systems will address the needs of Georgia's workforce by producing graduates well-equipped to manage complex unmanned systems, including self-driving cars and autonomous delivery drones. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, mechanical

engineering jobs, which include robotics engineers, are expected to grow by more than 9% by 2026.

"We are thrilled to usher in this new era of engineering at KSU," said Ian Ferguson, dean of the Southern Polytechnic College of Engineering and Engineering Technology. "These two degrees will further emphasize our status a leader in engineering and generate tremendous opportunities for our students moving forward."
